

Ontario After One Year of Ford: Governing for the Base Revives Liberal & Green Fortunes



Methodology ^{1 of 2}

• **Methodology:** Online survey

• **Sample:** N=1,527 eligible Ontario voters

• **Field window:** April 28 – May 1, 2019

• **Reliability:** Online samples cannot officially be assigned a margin of error. As a guideline*, a probability sample of this size carries a margin of error of \pm 2.5%, 19 times out of 20. The margin of error is larger for sub-segments. This report puts a special focus on 3 key sub-segments:

- 2018 PC Voters: Ontarians who voted PC in the June 2018 provincial election.
- Current PC Voters: Ontarians who would vote PC today (decided and leaning).
- Former PC Voters: Ontarians who voted PC in 2018, but no longer express such intent.
- Ford Nation: PC Voters for whom a main reason for voting PC in 2018 was a strong affinity for Doug Ford.
- As flexible demographic and regional quotas were employed to ensure reliable and comparable sub-segment analysis, the data has been weighted by current gender, age, & region Census data, to ensure the sample reflects the actual adult population of Ontarians.



A hyper-partisan Legislature and a diffuse, distracted Ford agenda has eroded support for the two official parties (PC and NDP).

- •This has benefitted the two parties without official status...the Liberals have rebounded to 26% under an interim leader (John Fraser) and the Greens, who are approaching a record high in public polling (11%).
- •The Ford PCs would still likely win the most seats if an election were held today, because of the turnout advantage of a older base that votes in greater proportions than the rest of the population. But the past year has eliminated the vote efficiency of the PC vote that led to the large majority because of the revival of the Liberals, putting the PC government at risk.
- •In particular, the third place standing for the PCs in Toronto (416), Eastern and Northern Ontario puts the seats gained there in the 2018 election at severe risk.
- •And the erosion of support in 905 would turn that region into a dog-fight in an election were held today.




One year later, 2018 PC voters are much more likely to cite "getting rid of Wynne" (70%) than "liking Doug Ford" (21%) as the reason for their PC vote.






May 2019 Current vote: Decided voters, leaners included Regional results
